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In 2004, artist and instructor Wendy Welch, founded the Vancouver Island School of Art. The school is accredited with the Private Career Training Institutions Agency (PCTIA).

The Vancouver Island School of Art offers high quality professional art courses for adults who want to study art on a full-time or part-time basis.

Students choose to enroll in either the Certificate of Visual Arts or the Diploma of Fine Arts or take courses and workshops outside of a program. Students who take courses and are not enrolled in a program can request to have hourly credits applied towards a Certificate or Diploma at a later date.

Courses are geared for beginners as well as more advanced artists looking to pursue new challenges. All courses offer an opportunity to develop skills, enhance an understanding of art, and discover what it means to be a practicing artist. In addition, all studio courses explore the technical aspects of materials and execution as well as focus on making art in a contemporary context.

ART FUNDAMENTALS

Design: Principles (FNDT 110)

This course explores the principles of design: process, unity, emphasis and focal point, scale and proportion, and balance and rhythm. Assignments are given in conjunction with a visual presentation of the subject matter. Students assemble a reference book with emphasis on developing an understanding of how the principles of design can be used in a two or three dimensional composition.

Bursary Work/study

Students in either the Certificate or Diploma program who have taken a minimum of two 12-week courses at the Vancouver Island School of Art or have permission of the Director are eligible to apply for Bursary Work/Study. Illustration Play (DRWG 217-36)

Based on a book by the same name, this course covers some of the new trends in handcrafted illustration using a mixed media approach that includes drawing, paper cutting, stitching and other craft-related methods of creating an image.

Drawing: Contemporary Approaches (DRWG 220)

This course provides an ideal entry point for students who want to go beyond 'creating a likeness' in drawing and it is geared to people interested in pushing their drawing in an innovative and extremely creative direction.

Drawing: Intermediate I (DRWG 201)

Building on the student's knowledge of basic drawing elements such as line, shape, value and composition, the course expands on the use of materials, techniques and compositional structures. Idea development and the formation of a personal image language within both historic and contemporary contexts are the focus of this course. Over twelve weeks students engage in exercises designed to stretch their approach to materials and ideas, with an emphasis on working through preliminary exercises to more fully realized projects. Refund Policy

A full refund will be provided if a course is cancelled by the Vancouver Island School of Art. If a student withdraws seven days or more before the start date of the first class, they will receive a refund less a 10% administration fee. If a student withdraws fewer than seven days before the start of the class, they will receive a refund less a 15% administrative fee. 

This course for students of all levels explores the process and versatility of watercolour. Designed for those who use watercolour exclusively as well as artists who use other mediums and are looking to investigate the expressive and descriptive qualities of the medium. Techniques explored include brush usage, drawing, colour mixing and collage. Students are encouraged to go beyond realism to explore the fundamentals of composition and expression.

Abstract Painting: Structure & Expression

(PNTG 212-36)

This course focuses on the ways artists approach the abstract image including using underlying structures such as the grid, architecture, nature, symbols as a starting point. Each project will be accompanied by examples of artists who are doing work related to the specific topic at hand. Through the process of combining structure and gesture, students discover their own personal language and approaches to abstraction.

DIPLOMA OF VISUAL ARTS & GRAPHIC DESIGN

As of September 2010, the Vancouver Island School of Art and the Pacific Design Academy are offering a collaborative Diploma of Visual Arts and Graphic Design. This program is comprised of a student doing one year in visual arts at the Vancouver Island School of Art (Certificate of Visual Arts equivalent) and then two years in the Graphic Design program at the Pacific Design Academy. The purpose of this program is to offer students who want to study graphic design a solid background in the fundamentals of hands-on artmaking and to develop a strong capacity to creative and imaginative thinking that they can apply to design projects.

INFORMATION FOR PROGRAM STUDENTS

Transfer Credits

The Vancouver Island School of Art accepts credits from other institutions based on the criteria that the courses are similar in content and duration. Not more than 50% of total acceptable credits can be transferred to a program. Hourly equivalents are determined on a case-by-case basis depending on the institution, course and year completed. Students who wish to transfer credits must provide transcripts from other institutions attended. Hourly credits completed at VISA by non-program students can also be transferred to a program up to a maximum of 100%.

Prior Learning Assessment

To be considered for Prior Learning Assessment, students must submit a letter and CV that clearly indicates previous experience in their field, as well as ten images (slides, jpegs or cd) of their work.

Mature Student Status

Applicants who are 19 years of age or older, who lack the minimum program admission requirement may apply as mature students. The Director will consider written requests for admission as a mature student. Applicants are asked to provide, in writing, details of other qualifications or experiences and documents from any completed educational courses or programs. The Director may request an interview.

(MMED 220)

This is a multi-media course that investigates the concept of wilderness including the role of wild territories and sacred landscapes within current art practices. Contemporary artists and writers who have re-worked the traditions of landscape art, land-art and connected practices including: eco-art, installation, art activism and time-based works are discussed. Students are encouraged to experiment with a range of media including painting, photography and video to create project-based work surrounding this wide-ranging topic. The course explores the psychological and physical presence of wilderness within Canadian art, with classes incorporating studio time, thematic lectures, field trips and connected discussions to create a supportive environment.

Collage: Investigation into Material (MMED 210)

This course follows the development of collage from its inception with Picasso to its use by many contemporary artists. The focus here is on becoming aware of the material world and of making use of material 'at hand'. Students learn how to transform everyday materials into dynamic components of a work of art. Projects include drawing, painting, photography and sculpture. No previous art experience is necessary.

Special Topics in Art: Identity as Source

(MMED 221)

From self-portraiture to exploring social and cultural identity, artists have long been fascinated with the figure and representation. This course explores the variety of ways we think of identity from our personal experience as an individual to our place in society and culture. Students are encouraged to use a range of media including drawing, painting, photography and video to explore the various ways ideas around identity can be expressed. Contemporary artists such as Kiki Smith, Ross Bleckner, Nancy Spero, Ann Hamilton (to name a few) are discussed in conjunction with this topic. Course includes studio time, thematic lectures and discussions.

IMPORTANT NOTE FOR PART-TIME PROGRAM STUDENTS:

In addition to Fall and Winter semesters, hourly credits can also be earned in workshops and in the Spring semester to accumulate the necessary hours to complete the Certificate of Visual Arts within the 4 year time requirement and the Diploma of Fine Arts within the 5 year time requirement. It is the responsibility of each student to ensure they complete the necessary requirements within the maximum allowable time. Academic Advising is available – please inquire at the office.

INDEPENDENT STUDIO PROGRAM

The Vancouver Island School of Art is pleased to offer the Independent Studio Program (ISP), which began in September 2009. This program is intended for graduates of a BFA, Diploma of Fine Arts or equivalent visual arts program who may want to ease themselves into professional practice or prepare for a Masters of Fine Arts degree. Over a period of two semesters, each ISP student works with an Advisor who offers critical feedback, technical support and general guidance in the realm of becoming a professional artist. Activities such as individual and group critiques, guest lectures, and gallery visits are consistent features of the program. Students are also mentored in the submission processes for both public and private galleries, granting agencies and graduate schools.

Entry Requirements

- completion of a Diploma of Fine Arts at the Vancouver Island School of Art or equivalent from other institution
- completed application with \$50 application fee
- cover letter outlining proposed project ideas and goals to be attained over the September to April duration of the program
- minimum of 12 digital photos of applicant's original work (for students who have not graduated from the Vancouver Island School of Art)
- transcripts from institutions where visual arts diploma/degree was attained if other than the Vancouver Island School of Art
- interview with Director

Program Requirements

- students work in their designated 'studio area' in the Senior Studio Classroom (Room 6) for a minimum of 20 hours per week for the duration of the Program
 - students attend bi-weekly* one-on-one meetings with Advisor and bi-weekly* (on alternative weeks) meeting with other 'fourth year' participants and Advisor.
- *days and times to be arranged at the start of the semester

Art and the Language of Craft (SCLP 108-36)

This new course focuses on drawing and sculpture projects informed by the language of craft. Students use a variety of craft-inspired processes such as gluing, cutting, stitching and sewing as well as craft-associated materials such as paper, fabric, beads, wood and other found objects and surfaces. Course includes an overview of contemporary artists who are using craft-related methods in their contemporary art practice.

PRINTMAKING

Printmaking: Monotype (PRNT 220)

This course includes several innovative monotype processes - from those requiring the simplest of materials with minimal equipment, to the more complex multiple layer 'hand pulled' print produced on the etching press. Positive and ghost imagery, handmade stencils and embossing will be just a few of the options explored. Participants become well versed in all aspects of producing a hand-pulled print. The intent of this course is to encourage participants to explore their personal creative identity while using the wide range of textural and mark-making possibilities of the monotype print. Class size is limited to 10 students. No experience required. Material fee: \$45 for inks and other printmaking supplies


Printmaking: Photo Etching (PRNT 225)

This course is designed to explore alternatives in image creation in both the intaglio and relief print while using a photopolymer plate in conjunction with the sun's rays, or a simple ultra-violet exposure system. Students work on paper using simple marks, photographs, sketches, altered imagery or memorabilia. This process offers possibilities of re-imagining existing images and materials to create a new work. Material fee: \$55 for inks, a polymer plate and other printmaking supplies

PHOTOGRAPHY

Documentary Photography & Video (PHOT 210)

This course is designed to provide students with a strong understanding of the traditions of documentary photography and video work. The course explores photo-documentary traditions within North America from the 1930's, to the present day placement of documentary work within contemporary art practices and the conceptual development of this genre within the digital age. The main focus of this class is to create a documentary based project from each student's interests and research. A broad range of artists are covered from Walker Evans to Robert Frank, Garry Winogrand, Lee Friedlander, Diane Arbus, Larry Towell and Susan Meiselas. Emerging and current practices within photography and video are investigated including the work of Stan Douglas, Jeff Wall, Sarah Anne Johnson and Raymonde April.

ART HISTORY & THEORY

Critical Studies I (ATHR 100)

This course introduces students to approaches and methodologies of visual literacy as they pertain to Western art. Focus is on studying a range of artworks, both historical and contemporary, through slide lectures, field trips, readings and discussion. Students develop the tools to analyze art works in aesthetic terms as well as understand the importance of social and historical context. Recommended textbook: *Criticizing Art* by Terry Barrett (1999 or later). Available at VISA for \$60 or you can purchase it secondhand on-line at amazon.ca for \$20-\$50.

Critical Studies II (ATHR 200)

In the second part of this course, students engage in a more conceptual and philosophical discourse surrounding visual culture. Lectures, readings, field trips and discussions introduce students to a more thorough understanding of the art world and the economic and social forces that shape visual art today. While looking at art is a fundamental part of this course, students are also challenged to develop a broader understanding of way contemporary artists relate to language, history and politics.

Prerequisite: *Critical Studies I* or permission of the Director.





DIPLOMA OF FINE ARTS

The Diploma of Fine Arts Program provides students with comprehensive knowledge and skills in the fine arts disciplines of drawing, painting, sculpture, photography and art history. Throughout the three-year program, students move from developing a basic vocabulary in art and design to completing a professional-quality body of work in their third year. This work will culminate with a Graduation Exhibition.

Who is the Diploma of Fine Arts for?

- those who have just completed high school and want to study art with small class size, extensive one-on-one time with instructors as well as a hands-on approach to teaching that balances technical and conceptual information
- those who already have a university degree and are looking for an alternate course of study; some of our students plan on applying for a graduate degree such as an MFA and are using their Diploma of Fine Arts to develop a high quality body of work to present to Graduate Studies Admissions
- professionals who are looking to move into an arts related career
- those in search of the necessary discipline and resources to become a professional artist



Art History: Minimalism to End of Century (AHIS 215)

Starting with the 1960's push towards 'Minimalism', this course follows the trends and ideas in art throughout the last part of the twentieth century. Students trace the legacies of modern art in the fractious beginnings of Conceptual and Performance art, the death and rebirth of painting and the developing importance of photography and video, with an emphasis on the relationship between idea, process and subject matter. Classes are based on slide lectures and documents such as artists' journals and manifestos, as well as contemporary politics and criticism. Lively class discussion and informative readings make course content engaging and relevant.

Art History: Dada to Pop (AHIS 216)

Using the Dada movement as a point of departure, this course follows Western visual art from early 20th century to mid-century and the 1960's Pop Art Movement. Students become familiarized with leading movements such as Surrealism, New Objectivity, Abstract Expressionism and Neo-Dada. Classes are based on slide lectures and documents such as artists' journals and manifestos and contemporary literature and music, this course investigates ideas, materials and biography as well as social and political context.

ADVANCED STUDIO

Advanced Studio I & II (INDS 312)

All Diploma students must complete Advanced Studio I & II to be eligible for graduation in the spring. Students in Advanced Studio focus on making a 'body of work' for their Graduating Exhibition. Students work independently for a minimum of six hours (preferably at the school) as well as on a one-on-one level with their advisor on a weekly basis (days/times to be arranged). In addition students participate in Advanced Studio Seminar (3 hours/week) to discuss the various issues related contemporary art as well as professional practices such as developing an artist statement. Guest mentors are invited to participate in critiques on an occasional basis. Advanced Studio credit is nine hours per week: six hours per week of independent work time at school which will include one-on-one consultation with faculty and three hours of class time.

Prerequisites: *Students need to have completed Advanced Studio I*

OPEN STUDIO

Open Studio (OPST 100)

Open Studio offers the opportunity to work with others in a studio setting outside of a regular classroom. There is a studio assistant on hand for individual critique; feedback and general advice on concerns or dilemmas with regards to specific projects students are working on. Students are expected to bring their own projects to work on during this designated time.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

Independent Study (INDS 201, 301, 401, 501)

This course gives students an opportunity to work on a project under the supervision of a faculty advisor. Students submit an application with a proposal outlining what they intend to work on in their independent study. At the end of the project, students present their work to their advisor and one other faculty member for a final critique. Independent Study can be taken up to a maximum of four times. The student and advisor set up a mutually convenient time and meet on a bi-weekly basis on a specified day and time for the duration of the semester. Independent Study students meet for one hour every two weeks and receive 36 credit hours upon completion.

Prerequisite: enrollment in the Diploma Program or with permission of the Director.

LIFE DRAWING DROP-IN

This drop-in studio provides students and others in the community an opportunity to drop-in and draw from the model. There is a studio coordinator for each of these sessions.

Drop In rates: VISA students \$10 or 5/\$40, non-students \$12 or 5/\$50. To qualify for the VISA student rate, students must be registered in a course at the time of purchase.

CURATORIAL WORK/STUDY

Students in this course learn the basics of running a non-profit art gallery, such as the Slide Room Gallery. There are two separate positions, Administrator and Preparator that students can apply for in this course. Students can apply to one position per term. This course can be taken up to four times.

Administrator (CURA 301-WI10)

Involves working with the artists, contracts, promotion, record-keeping other administrative tasks.

Preparator (CURA 302-WI10)

Involves upkeep of the gallery space, assisting in the install and de-install of exhibitions.

Students in both positions meet with facilitators on a bi-weekly basis to discuss various issues around curating, both as they relate specifically to the Slide Room Gallery as well as to the role of the curator in the world at large. There is no fee for this course as it is work/study offering. This course is open to Diploma Program students only and it only requires that students fill in a registration form prior to the start of the semester. Space is limited.

CERTIFICATE OF VISUAL ARTS

The Certificate of Visual Arts provides basic training in the fundamentals of drawing, painting, photography, sculpture and art history. The Certificate of Visual Arts can be completed within one year (full-time) or over a period of four years (part-time).

Who is the Certificate of Visual Arts for?

- those who want to study art but do not have an extensive visual arts background
- those who need to develop a portfolio for admission to an arts program at the university level
- professionals in other careers who want to enrich their lives through art
- those who have been taking art courses for several years and would like to start working towards a specific goal and complete a program
